

# Leadership SWAPPIES 08

**Swap:** verb, swapped, swapping, noun

-verb (used with object)

1. to exchange, barter, or trade, as one thing for another: He swapped his wrist watch for the radio.

-verb (used without object)

2. to make an exchange.

-noun

3. an exchange: He got the radio in a swap.

-noun (used in Job's Daughters)

4. a swappie- an item exchanged between Jobies at events in order to meet new people and exchange contact information.

This year we would like each daughter attending Leadership to make a total of 21 swappies. One swappie will be turned in at registration and the remaining 20 will be exchanged Friday night at the Ice Cream Social.

Swappies can come in any color, size or shape. For the Leadership swap we ask that your swappie be representative of what leadership means to you. If you get stumped, make sure that your swappie is representative of you. Your favorite animal, color, etc. Above all, make sure that your name and Bethel number are on it or attached. Any additional contact information that you want to include is up to you.


The more thought you put into your swappie the easier it will be when you get to Leadership. Upon arriving at registration you will need to have the 21st swappie ready to attach to an index card. On the index card you are to write an explanation of your swappie and why it represents Leadership, you, etc.

When attending Supreme Session this is one of the best ways to meet new people. Daughters and adults alike have fun preparing their swappies every year. The best swappies are creative and hand-made and representative of the individual and the state they are from. They do not need to cost a lot of money or even be store bought. But there is no right or wrong way to make a swappie.
